BC Megafauna Project

Laura Termes, PhD student and osteologist for the BC Megafauna Project at Simon Fraser



University Archeologist Department, came to museum on June 18th to take samples of three separate mammoth teeth specimens on loan from the Baird family. All three specimens were found in the Baird Bros. Gravel Pit over the last 30 years. After initial testing at SFU labs (to ensure there is enough collagen



in the samples to proceed) the samples will be sent to an Ontario lab for radiocarbon dating. The turnaround for the results is approximately six to eight months. North Columbia Trading – Interview by Bob Cowan

The Enderby and District Museum has a number of very important on-going projects. These include The Property Index which identifies every property in Enderby and Area F by street address and provides as much information as can be gleaned from BC Assessment and local newspapers. Another important project is up-dating the files of every family that has lived in the Enderby area. My personal project has been interviewing residents and transcribing the tapes. The transcriptions are then placed in a binder and the appropriate file. In the early 1980s I met with Ted Peel and Ruby Lidstone weekly for six months, listening to them recount the early part of the 20th Century in Enderby. Most recently I interviewed Lee Starrett who along with Walt Velardo and Bruce Hedden established North Columbia Trading, a manufacturing company in the location of the recently closed Ashley Furniture store in the late 1970s.



The question that has consumed local conversations about attracting business has always been “Why Enderby?” Lee didn’t just pick Enderby out of a hat. He and his partners were from Southern California and by the late 1960s they had determined that they wanted to leave urban California. They were

part of a popular “back to the land” movement of that era. Invariably Lee and his family toured the western states in a VW bus. A business associate of Lee’s suggested the Vernon area of British Columbia. Almost purchasing in Coldstream, they met Enderby real estate agent, Gordon Dale, whom they found to be the most focused and personable of the agents they had thus far dealt with. At that very time, the land along the river from Cliff to the Spallumcheen Band Reserve was traded from the former mill owners to the Provincial Government for timber licences. It was then leased to private enterprise for 99 years. Since the land was already zoned industrial, Lee and Walt saw the site as a perfect manufacturing possibility.

They initially built a Steiner Arch building, and began manufacturing gift ware. At first, as with most businesses, it was difficult to break into the market. But they persisted and by the late 1980s, they had built another building and had two shifts producing gift ware. They were a success. Lee emphasized that whatever profit they accumulated, they put it back into the business.

Lee, Walt (and Walt’s parents) along with Bruce moved to the rural area, and have been here ever since. Tragedy struck in 1992 when fire destroyed the buildings. They had insurance and announced in the local media that they would rebuild. Then their accountant suggested they do something else since they had not really made money manufacturing because they kept putting the money back into the business. That’s when Dennis Case stepped in and suggested a new furniture store in that location.



So to answer the above question “Why Enderby?” The answer appears to be a personable real estate agent, Gordon Dale, reasonably priced land, and a determination to succeed.

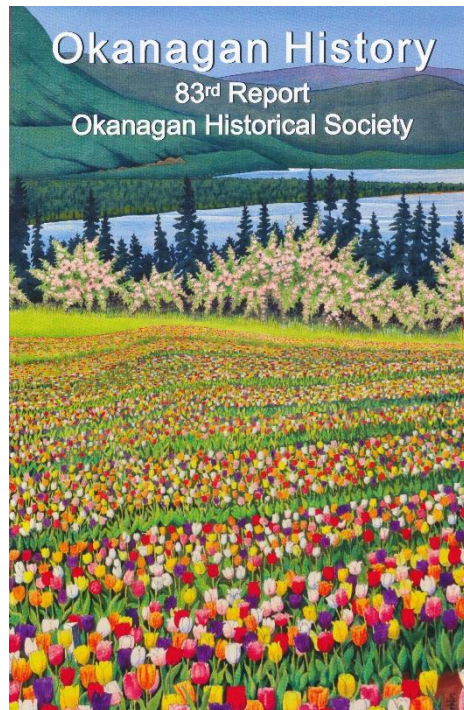
Dads and kids, make mom happy - come in and get your photos done - it's less than an hour of your life to give mom the family photo she's always wanted!

83rd Report of the Okanagan Historical Society

The latest Okanagan History is available for sale in the museum for \$25. There is a new format this year. The articles are arranged by communities, starting with Salmon Arm and ending with Osoyoos. There are short histories of each community plus a short history of the Okanagan Valley by the editor. For Enderby there is a reprint from *Flowing through Time: Stories of Kingfisher and Mabel Lake*, namely W.O. Mitchell at Mabel Lake by his son Hugh. For Armstrong there is student essay contest winner Jessica Kruger's biography of C.W. Holliday, early photographer and historian of the North Okanagan. Also included is Carmen Kirkland and Dick File's *Brightlea Ranch Tragedy*, a love triangle that resulted in two murders. There is much more in the book including *Lives Remembered*. Local historian, Bob Cowan, was the editor of this edition. He was last editor thirty years ago.
